

Overlooking Astoria

Situated near the mouth of the Columbia River, Astoria is named after legendary investor and America's first millionaire, John Jacob Astor. The tycoon's American Fur Company founded Fort Astoria in 1810, making the site not only the company's primary fur trading post in the Northwest, but also the first permanent American settlement west of the Rockies. Other historic figures and facts linked to Astoria include Lewis & Clark, who stayed near present-day Astoria during the winter of 1805-06, and how in 1847, the first post office west of the Rockies was established here. A look into the past is yours to enjoy as you stroll past some of the city's many restored Victorian homes and explore the revitalized 1920s era downtown. Of course, Astoria's natural beauty is as renowned as its history, with its "Little San Francisco" character set against the steep, wooded hillsides of a temperate rain forest.

Major Attractions

A. Columbia River Maritime Museum

- Displays one of the most extensive collections of nautical artifacts on the west coast.
- Hands on and interactive exhibits include a tugboat Wheeler and the National Historic Landmark, the Lightship Colombia.

B. Heritage Centre Museum

- The museum includes exhibits interpreting Clatsop County's history.
- The building contains over 10,000 cataloged historic photographs.

C. Flavel House Museum

- Built by George Flavel in 1885, a Columbia River bar pilot who was one of the area's first millionaires.
- The restored historic Queen Anne Style Victorian home offers a glimpse into life in Astoria at the turn of the century.

D. Astoria Column

- Built in 1926, standing at 125 feet (38 m), the tower overlooks the Columbia River on top of Coxcomb Hill.
- The column was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1974.

Geography Information/ History

After the Pacific Fur Company failed, the Astoria Fort and the fur trade were sold to the British in 1813. By 1818 the area was restored to the US however the fur trade stayed under British rule until the mid 1840's. With the increase of American Pioneers, Astoria soon grew as a port city, becoming the first US Port Office west of the Rocky Mountains in 1947. Unfortunately in 1883 and again in 1922, downtown Astoria was devastated by fire, partly due to most of the buildings being made of wood. However Astoria continued to grow and serve as a port of entry for over a century and remains the trading centre for the lower Colombian Basin. Today the city has become a hub for tourism, especially as a port of call for many cruise ships.

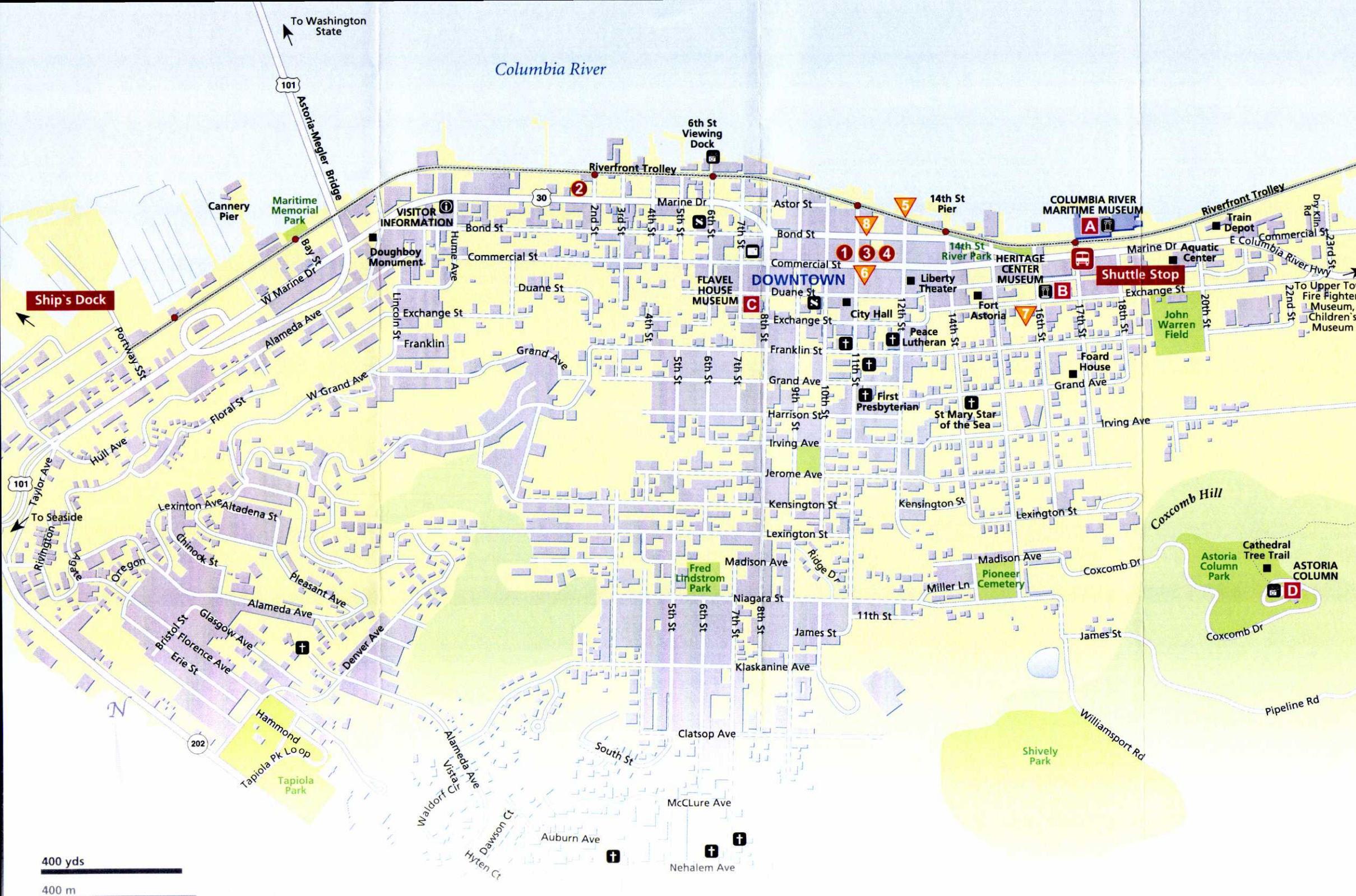
